

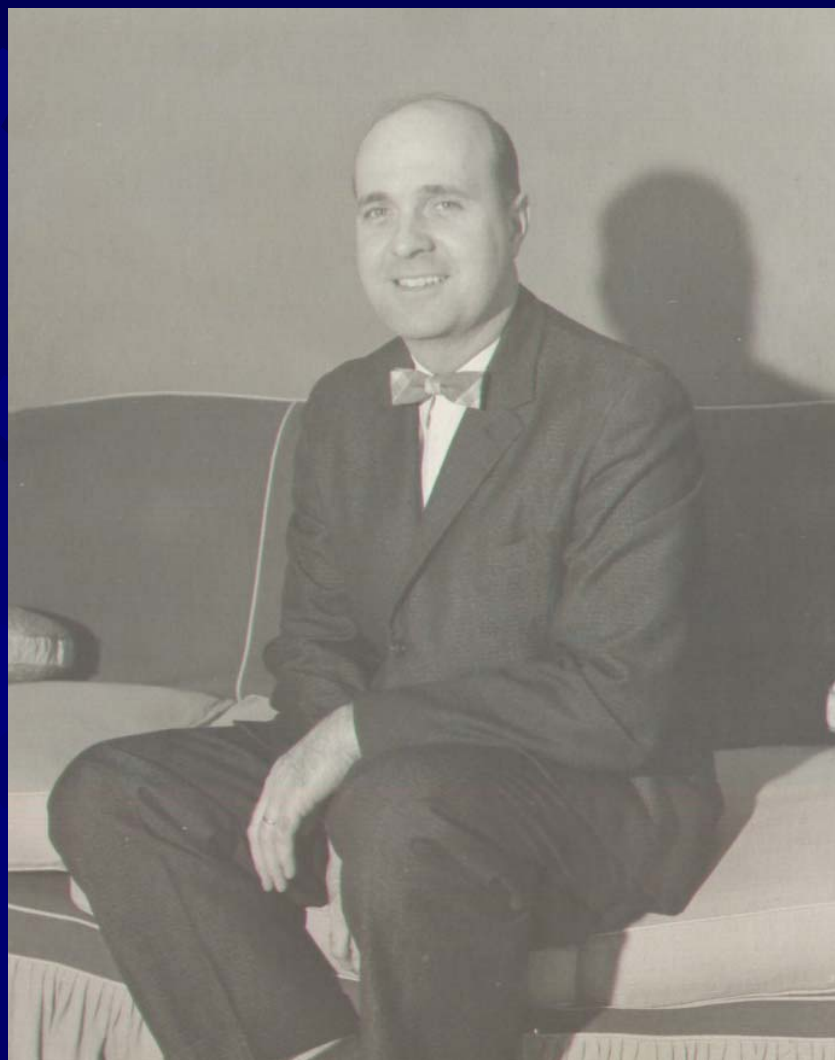

“On December 28, 1962 the winter business meeting of the IAAP was held at the commerce park building, Harrisburg, PA. The meeting was a hallmark in the eyes of the many industrial arts leaders. At this meeting, Dr. John Struck of the Department of Public Instruction introduced the newly appointed representative of the DPI staff as Consultant on Industrial Arts Education. The new representative, Mr. William Hartman, was then afforded the cooperation of the association in his endeavors”.



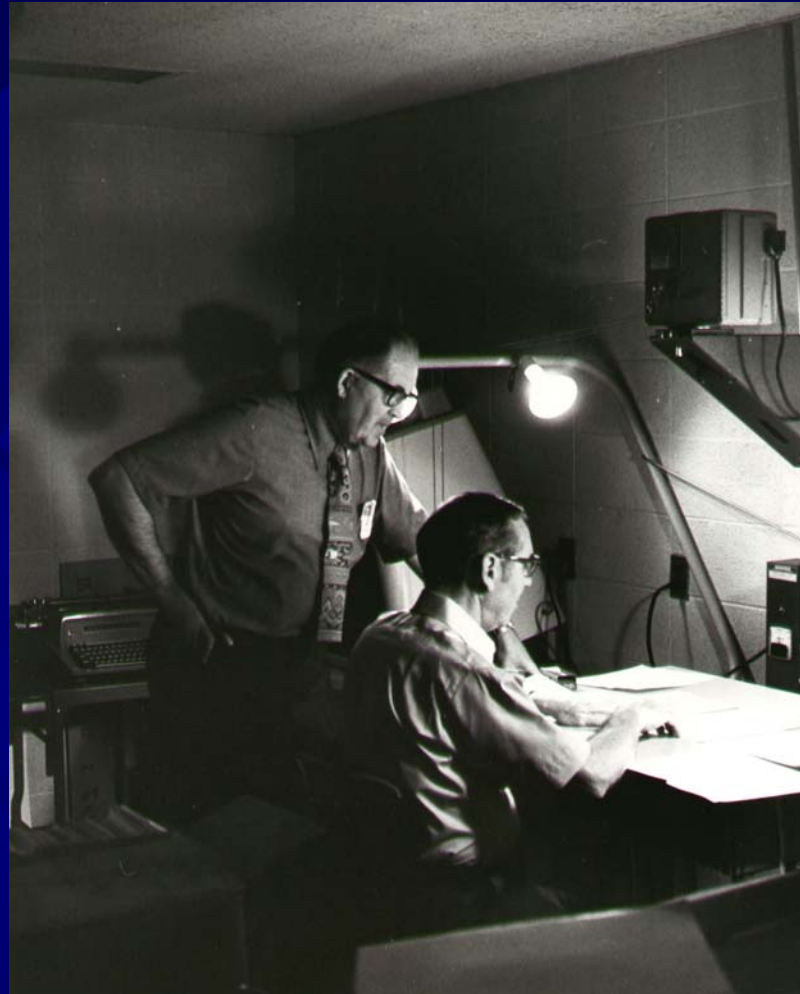

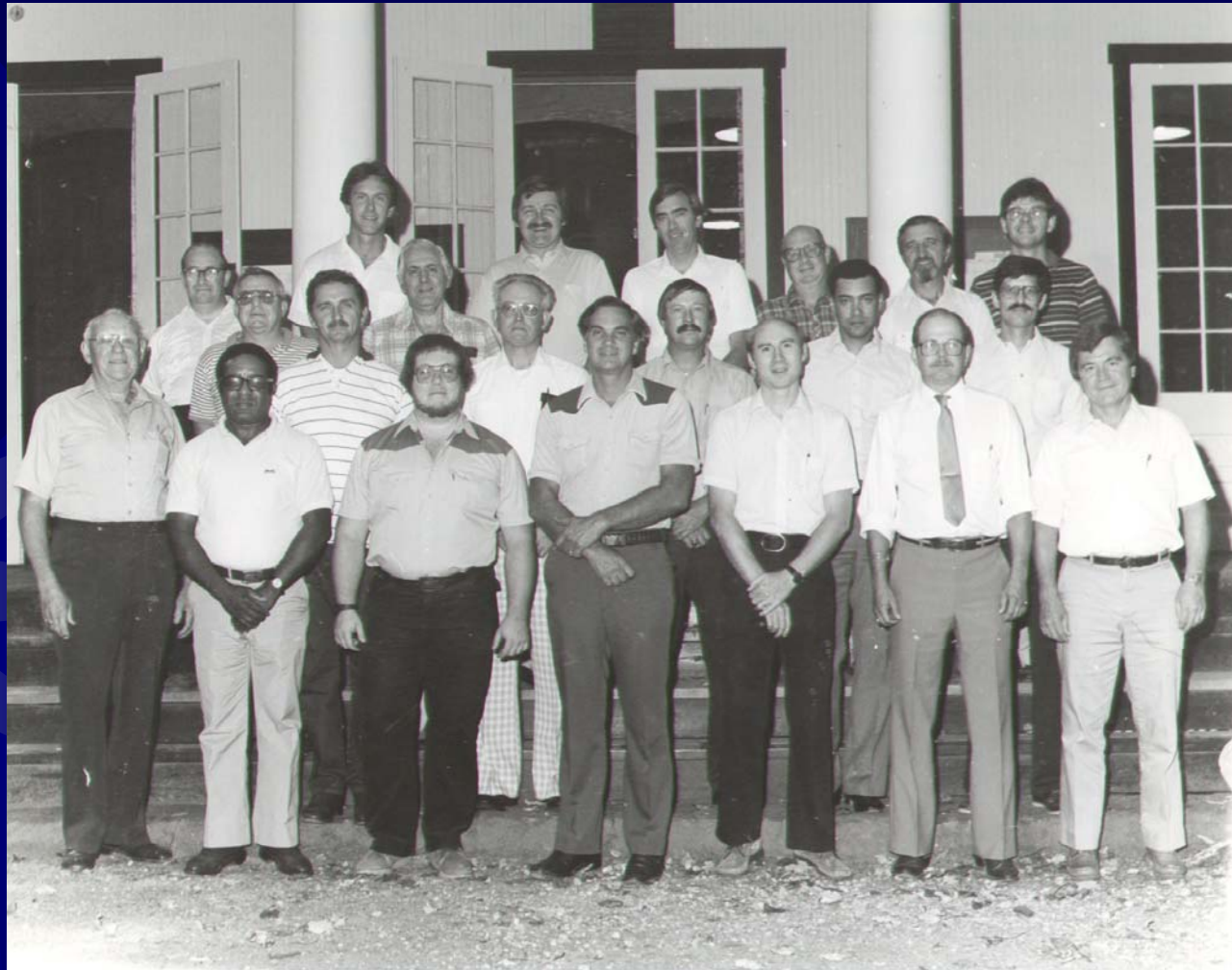

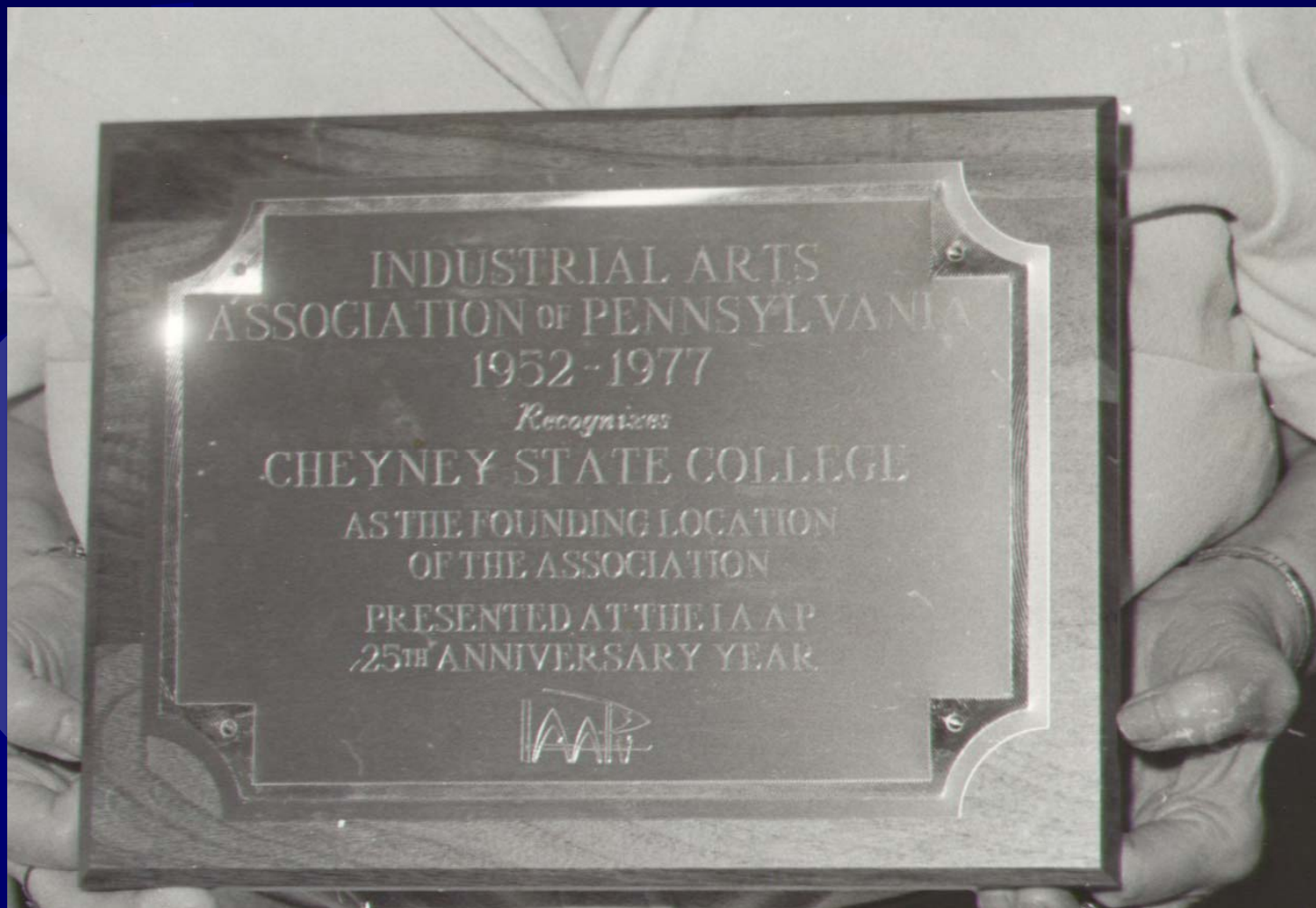


- 1) Strong teachers that are involved, participate in professional meetings and development






